

WILLIAM TAUBMAN: BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

William Taubman, Bertrand Snell Professor of Political Science at Amherst College, is the author of Khrushchev: The Man and His Era, published by W. W. Norton in March 2003. Khrushchev was awarded the 2004 Pulitzer Prize for biography. It also received the 2004 National Book Critics Award for biography, the Wayne S. Vucinich Prize of the American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies, and the Robert H. Ferrell Book Prize of the Society of Historians of American Foreign Policy. Taubman is also the author of The View from Lenin Hills: Soviet Youth in Ferment (1967), Governing Soviet Cities (1973), and Stalin's American Policy (1982); co-author, with his wife, Jane Taubman, of Moscow Spring (1989); editor-translator of Khrushchev on Khrushchev by Sergei N. Khrushchev (1990); and co-editor (with Sergei Khrushchev and Abbott Gleason) of Nikita Khrushchev (2000). In addition to scholarly articles and reviews, he has written op-ed pieces and book reviews for The New York Times, The Boston Globe, The Chicago Tribune, The Atlanta Constitution, The Los Angeles Times and The Washington Post. Taubman is currently president of the American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies. He is also chairman of the Advisory Committee of the Cold War International History Project at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington. He is currently at work on a biography of Mikhail Gorbachev.
